## Niagara Falls Downtown Advisory Committee Formed

In July of 2024, Niagara Falls City Council approved the formation of a Downtown Advisory Committee to bring together stakeholders from the business community for the beautification and promotion of downtown.

The committee was set up to provide input on the use of the unspent levy and other assets from the dissolved Downtown Business Improvement Area (BIA). They also aim to identify and advise Council on policies, strategies or programs that may support downtown development.

The downtown committee will maintain a maximum of 11 voting members including the Mayor and one Council Member. The rest of the committee will be composed of up to nine members representing Commercial Properties and/or Businesses in the Downtown Core. A staff liaison from the City's Business Development Department is dedicated to support the committee on a non-voting basis.

At the City Council meeting on November 12th, 2024, Council voted in 8 committee members by secret ballot. The ninth vote was a tie between 3 people and forfeited. The founding members were as follows: Josh Pereira, Pouria Sadeghi, Kelly Crossley, Eddy Pybus, Gus Ellinas, Victoria Martin, Ronald Charbonneau and Daelys Faife. Councillor Mona Patel is the one councilor on the committee.

The term of the advisory Committee is concurrent with the term of Council and will exist until Council decides that another appropriate entity has been formed to undertake the work of the Committee or until Council disbands the Committee.

The first public meeting of the new committee was held on November 14th, 2024, and



was chaired by Mayor Jim Diodatti. A budget of \$35,000 was approved for flowers and their watering for the Summer of 2025. Also discussed, was the dissolving of the assets from the last BIA.

According to the City of Niagara Falls website, the current committee members are as follows: Mayor Jim Diodatti, Councillor Mona Patel, Ron

Charbonneau, Kellie Crossley, Daelys Faife, Gus Ellinas, Victoria Martin, Eddy Pybus, Pouria Sadeghi, Chris Byrnes, Tony Barranca and Cat Thagard.

Since the formation of the committee, the majority of the former BIA assets including Christmas decorations and huts from the 2022 Christmas market have successfully been

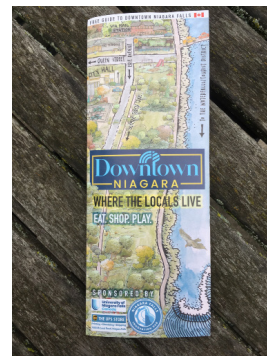

# Valley Way Was Once a River

## Muddy Run Creek: Niagara Falls' Forgotten Treasure

Yes, it's true! There was once a river that flowed diagonally across the city and directly through our downtown area! Muddy Run Creek originated from many natural springs in Cook's Bog in the area of Dorchester Road, Lundys Lane and the QEW. It poured across farmers' fields and pastures until it reached Stanley Avenue at Portage Road. From there, it

Muddy Run Creek was a significant part of life for Niagara Falls's early residents. Although it is called Muddy Run, it was a clear and beautiful river. In the Summer, the creek decreased in size, and it remained only as a puddle in some places. After the spring thaw, and through the fall rainstorms, it would regularly flood its banks and become muddy, covering parts of Victoria Avenue (near St. Patrick's Church) and other areas of town with mud and debris hence, its namesake.

were located where the current Shoppers Drug Mart is on Victoria Avenue. The ponds were then backfilled when they built a grocery store there.

Recreationally, in the Summer, the river's cool, clear waters, as well as the ice-collecting ponds were used for swimming. Some of the best swimming holes were located in an area called 'Valleyway' at Second Avenue. In the Winter, the river was enjoyed for ice skating. The water was said to be so clear that skaters could see fish swimming beneath the ice as they were skating on top!

Despite its benefits, seasonal flooding was problematic. The flooding covered streets with mud and debris and frequently washed away bridges. Also, the river impeded the path of the new Great Western Railway being built.

In 1865, a tunnel was built to carry water under the newly constructed Great Western Railway near the train station. Though it was somewhat effective, the seasonal flooding proved to be too much for the tunnel to handle. When the first train arrived in Niagara Falls, the flooding was so great that the train engineer stopped because he thought they were heading into a river. Flooding on Bridge Street at the tunnel's location was a regular issue.

At some point before 1887, a wooden bridge and boardwalk were built across the river on the south side of Victoria Avenue. At this location, Muddy Run Creek was made to flow into a series of culverts, under Queen Street, and directly under Clendening's Planing Mill,

which is now Heart Niagara. It followed its path underground past the train station to exit a tube into the gorge just south of the White Water Walk.

On two occasions, people and animals fell into the river upstream, only to emerge safely 10 minutes later and be rescued as they were spat out of the pipe before they cascaded over the gorge wall only 500 meters away!

In 1919, a storm sewer was built into the river's bed, and in 1925, Muddy Run Creek was diverted into sewer piping from Fourth Avenue to the culverts on Queen Street. The old river was filled in, and Valley Way Road was laid on top. In the late 20s and into the 40s, beautiful homes were built along the bank of the old river.

Though now hidden from view, the memory of Muddy Run Creek endures in the shape of our downtown streets. So, the next time you find yourself traveling down Valley Way, take a moment to remember the forgotten treasure that once flowed there, connecting the past to the present in the natural flow that is our incredible history.

### Library Needs Help to Maintain Historic Images

flowed down Valley Way, across Queen Street and tumbled off the Gorge wall in a beautiful cascade near the Whirlpool.

Here is an excerpt from the description of Muddy Run Falls in 'Peck's Tourist's Companion to Niagara Falls' published in 1845: *'The cascade formed by this little stream is beautiful and unique. The waterfalls in a brilliant sparkling shower of silver spangles and, flashing off from the rocks below, send up its mimic clouds of spray and the sheen of its twinkling specs of foam. Then, sliding down the black bank, like a beamy serpentine strip of sunlight, it*

Muddy Run Creek was used by the townsfolk for both leisure and business. In 1791, John Donaldson used a water wheel where the creek cascaded over the gorge wall to power his mill. At Stanley and Portage Road, canneries that used the river for their production popped up, and tanneries also appeared along the riverbanks.

Ice harvesting was a big business for several local entrepreneurs. Ice harvesting ponds along the river collected ice in the winter. The ice was covered with sawdust and stored in ice houses. The first Clifton Hotel, built in 1833, used ice harvested from the river. Those ice-collecting ponds

# Roberts Robbed

## Suspects Still On the Loose

Roberts Jewellers, one of Downtown's oldest establishments, at 41 years old; was robbed this March, leaving Owners Anna and Carmen Tartaglia deeply disheartened at losing such a large amount of uninsured jewellery.

Police are asking for the public's help in capturing the two men who breached the steel front gates and front doors of the Queen Street establishment. The perpetrators used a stool to reach the top of the gate where they cut through the metal. Some members of the community reported hearing the grinding noises.

On Wednesday, March 5, 2025 at approximately 5:30 AM, uniform members of the Niagara Regional Police Service assigned to 2 District (Niagara Falls/Niagara-on-the-Lake), responded to Roberts Jewellers, located at 4416 Queen Street in the City of Niagara Falls, for a break and enter call for service.

The police have released footage and photographs to the public, and it has been determined that the suspects are 2 white males. The Owners are also seeking the identity of a white, adult female who's photograph is in the front window of the shop. The woman came into the store and took photographs of the jewelry cases only hours before the incident.

The men, caught on video, walked around the store grabbing items off of the shelves, and out of the display cases and putting them into what appear to be garbage bags. They took diamond and gold rings as well as charms and earrings.

While the monetary loss

is enormous, what saddened Anna the most was the loss of her collection of Italian gold religious articles. For over 40 years, she had been painstakingly curating these pieces. Especially meaningful to her, were the Madonnas. Italy is known for these designs and has won awards the world over for their incredible workmanship. Many of these pieces were on display, but were of too much sentimental value to ever sell.

These articles are not replaceable. "No one will ever have those things again, and the sad thing is that they probably just melted them down to pocket the money at a loss", laments Anna. The artwork and craftsmanship of those artworks is worth many times more than the gold itself.

The entire burglary took just over one minute, and the bandits were off and gone.

One male is approximately age 50 with glasses, and was wearing a dark green hoodie with a baseball cap, black pants and green shoes. He was wearing black gloves and a black scarf covering his mouth and chin.

The other suspect is a heavy set male who was also wearing a green hoodie, black pants and blue shoes. Suspect number 2 has a 'distinct walk' which can be seen in the video footage.

The security footage also revealed that the 2 men were driving a dark grey or black mini-van which they used to escape.

Police are continuing to investigate, and are appealing to



the public for any information that may help them identify the people involved. Witnesses, community members with footage or those who might identify the suspects, are asked; If you have an information, to contact the Niagara Regional Police Service at 905-688-4111 (option 3 extension 1009901). Incident # 25-22853.

You can also report anonymously through Crime Stoppers of Niagara at 1-800-222-8477 or online at CrimeStoppersNiagara.ca. Crime stoppers offers cash rewards to people who contact the program with information which leads to an arrest.

Now that the dust has settled, Anna and Carmen have found the silver lining in the situation. "We never would have expected how kind people have been. Even people from out of town". Says Anna. People from both the local area as well as from out of town have been visiting the store, sharing their blessings and happily shopping once again.

In recent months, there has been a rash of Jewellery Store robberies across Niagara. On Jan 16th, there was a group of people involved in the robbery of a jewelry store at the Pen Centre. This event was followed by a group targeting a downtown Grimsby jewelry store not once but twice. Stores in Stratford have suffered a similar fate, and there have been several like incidents reported across Ontario this year.

In spite of the attack on their business, Anna and Carmen are staying open. Their business is their joy, and is "more than just a store." It is also a "social place." The couple refuse to let adversity get them down and are moving into the new season with resilience.

Try as we will, wait as we may, even here we cannot see into the heart of Niagara.

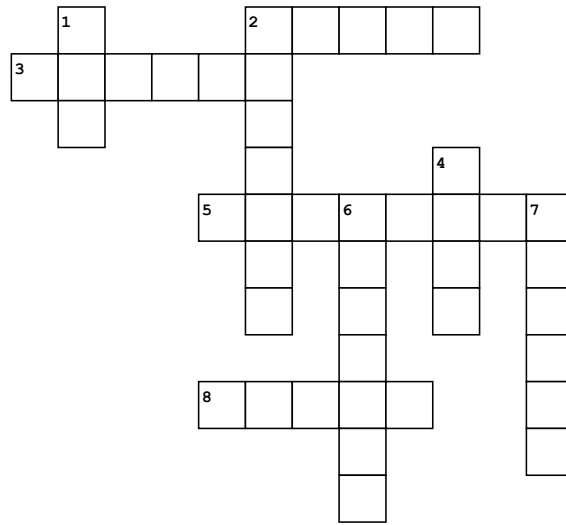
But here we can see it beat and the organ-peak if it's beauty fills our ears.
